



Dr. Paul Alaback is the Champion Professor of Forest Ecology at the University of Montana. He is a leading authority on the ecology of temperate rainforests, and is the author of over 50 technical publications, and one book. He did his graduate work at Oregon State University, specializing in forest ecology. He has been studying the ecology of temperate rainforests throughout the Americas over the past 30 years. He has been particularly interested in how climate controls the function and diversity of these forests, and how they respond to both natural and human-caused disturbances. He has been involved in translating ecological research into policy and applications working with land managers, the media and policy makers. He was a scientist with the Pacific Northwest Research Station of the

U.S. Forest Service for 8 years, then joined the faculty of forestry at the University of Montana in 1993. He currently teaches and does research on forest & grassland ecology, and natural history education.
