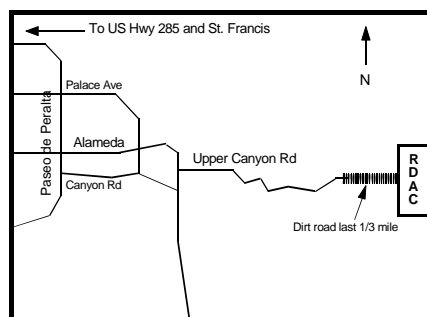

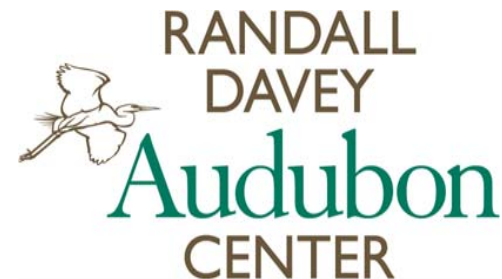

Nestled in Santa Fe Canyon, the Randall Davey Audubon Center is a 135-acre wildlife sanctuary with hiking trails, an Environmental Education Center, Visitor Center/Nature Store, and the offices for Audubon New Mexico. It is also the site of the historic adobe home, art studio and grounds of the Santa Fe artist, Randall Davey.



- ❖ Landscape includes rolling hills, woodlands & grasslands, maintained lawns & gardens, a wildlife Master Garden, & orchard from the Davey era.
- ❖ Hiking trails skirt a large meadow of mixed grasses in a loop where over 120 plant species may be found.
- ❖ The Bear Canyon trail winds upward through a pinyon/juniper woodland with ponderosa pines in the upper elevations.

# ACTIVITIES



**GUIDED BIRDING WALKS:** Every Saturday morning at 8:30 a.m. an experienced birder leads visitors on an easy birding walk through the grounds and on the trails. Bring your binoculars or borrow a pair from us. Reservations are not necessary, and the walks are *free*. Please come a few minutes early and meet the leader in the parking lot.

Call us for information on *Private Birding Walks* that are conducted at the Center during the Spring through the Fall. The fee for these walks is **\$20 per person**.

**HISTORIC HOME & STUDIO TOURS:** Listed in national, state and city registers of historic and cultural buildings, the Randall Davey house was originally a mill built in 1847 by the U.S. Army; it later became the home of Davey and his wife, Isabel. Today it is maintained as a museum that contains the Davey's antique furnishings, artifacts and many of his original works of art.

*House Tours are Fridays at 2:00 p.m. The fee is \$5 per person. Please call us to arrange for a private tour.*

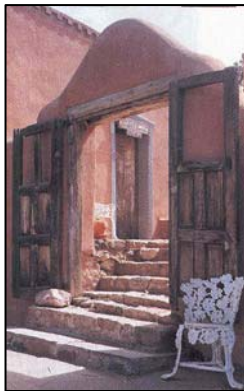

## RANDALL DAVEY ~THE ARTIST

One of the vanguards of modern art, Randall Davey was born in East Orange, New Jersey in 1887. His decision to become an artist led him to New York in 1908 where he studied under the tutelage of Robert Henri.

After a motor trip from New York to New Mexico in 1919, Davey decided to settle in Santa Fe. He became an important part of the Santa Fe art



colony, and was a skilled painter, printmaker and sculptor. Davey successfully practiced his art here in his studio until his death, when in 1964, he was killed in an automobile accident. He and his second wife, Isabel Holt are buried on the property.

In 1983, the Davey family, through the Randall Davey Foundation, generously gave the property to the National Audubon Society, to be preserved as a wildlife sanctuary, and used as an educational, art and historical center. Davey's work, along with antique furnishings and personal memorabilia are exhibited in the house, art studio and administrative offices.
